# ONTARIO HOUSING AFFORDABILITY

The research report investigates how housing affordability in Ontario differs between immigrants and non-immigrants based on income and education levels. Based on the findings, we made recommendations such as preferred mortgage rates for newcomers and first-time buyer immigrants, as well as introducing a social housing structure in collaboration with the private sector to provide low-cost rentals. The study emphasizes the need for continued attention to housing affordability in Ontario, taking into account income, immigration status, and the nuanced experiences of different groups.

## **Core Housing Need (CHN)**



14% (N=7333)

#### of Ontario Residents have CHN

We found that 15% of immigrants (231 out of 1,548) have core housing needs while 13% of Canadian-born citizens (652 out of 5,009) had core housing needs.

• Core housing need means that a household fails to meet at least one of three standards established for housing adequacy, suitability, and affordability (Canadian Housing Survey, 2021)




Immigrants had a higher proportion of first-time homebuyers within the past five years at 7%, compared to 6% among Canadian-born residents. Immigrants, had a higher average income of \$97,767 compared to \$93,140 for Canadian-born individuals, potentially have a stronger financial base for the housing market

residents out of 1,017 Ontarian residents live in social housing i.e. housing provided by employer or government, etc.



## Recommendations



Subsidize housing for first-time immigrant buyers, especially in less populated areas, to alleviate housing stress in crowded regions.



Low

Partner with the private sector to construct affordable rental apartments in densely populated low-income areas, streamlining building processes.



Introduce a 'Rent-to-Own' scheme and a tiered rent control system for newer apartments to help lower-income residents afford housing.



Research immigrant housing experiences to inform and ensure equitable housing program designs for all.
